


Message from the Pastor

I was sixteen years old in the summer of 1997, when the United Methodist Women of Arlington United Methodist Church sent me on a trip to Washington, DC and New York with other kids from points west and south in Kansas. There were about a dozen of us, all of us from small town and rural congregations - from my own church (which had maybe 60 folks on an average Sunday) there were only two youth. We were taking an Amtrak from Newton, KS to Chicago, where we would transfer onto another train to go to New York; after about five days there, we would finish up with a week in Washington, DC before boarding the train home.

My eyes were about to be opened very, very wide to the world around me.

In New York, we visited the building for our General Board of Global Ministries, which is right across the street from the United Nations campus. Many of our global ministries- education. health, hunger, housing, and new congregations the world over - come through this space, and the wide-eyed Kansas kids were introduced to some big projects underway. We met with inmates from Riker's Island Prison, and sought over the course of a tense two hours to find some sort of common life and language to our experiences. What I remember most, though, is that the room we met in had a stained glass window with a picture of an eye in it. The idea was that it showed the UN across the street that the people of the church were keeping an eye on what the political leaders of the world were doing. But, our guide also told us, it was also an eye that looked in: the world could see, in real time, how the church was handling its own affairs and tending its own mission.

After that we went to a couple of Broadway shows (Les Misérables and that spiritual classic, Chicago...!), we headed south on the train toward DC. As a city it is much more human in scale; with the rule that no building can be taller than the Washington Monument, the architecture of the place doesn't have the other-worldly skyscrapers of Manhattan. There we visited the United Methodist General Board of Church and Society - this is the agency in the church which keeps an eye on public policy, and lobbies on behalf of the church according to our Social Principles (worth reading if you never have - a quick Google search should lead you there, and we have copies available in our church library). At the end of this trip, I had spent two weeks in the largest cities I had ever set foot in outside of Kansas City. My world was bigger than before I had left, to be sure.

But the large eye in the window in the UMC Global Ministries building was what followed me home from that trip and stayed

with me all through returning to Washington, DC, as a young adult for my seminary education 4 years later. The church may be keeping an eye on how the world does its business, but as or more importantly, the world can see exactly what we are doing, and how we are doing it, and whether we are doing anything at all, period.

I write this days before the Moreys head to DC on a family adventure; we will see some old friends, visit monuments and museums, and ponder the relationship, always muddy and complicated, between the life of the church and the life of the nation. It is sinful to collapse the mission of the church into some pale imitation of a party platform, and we are rightly horrified by the ways our faith and its symbols and language have become weapons of violent extremist voices. It is also sinful to pretend that we can live our lives as we please, completely ignoring the wounds of the world around us. The task is ever before us to "work out our salvation with fear and trembling" (Philippians 2:12), and that demands that we take seriously the call to live our faith in every part of our lives - home, work, play, and in how we do life in public.

The temptation, as always, is to close our eyes, hoping - much like a toddler still developing object permanence - that if we can't see the problem, then it isn't real, and no one can see us. Images from the new James Webb telescope are instructive for us all: looking deep into the dark sometimes reveals things we never had the right lens and light to see before. We remember the words of Zora Neale Hurston: "they seemed to be staring at the dark, but their eyes were watching God."

There are many such places we can direct our own eyes: toward our neighbors at Viking Terrace, the bereft families of Uvalde, TX, emergency rooms and clinics serving through the chaotic consequences of Supreme Court rulings, the internment camps Russia is forcing Ukrainians into, the North African countries where devastating famine hurts infants and children first, every time.

Let's deploy a "James Webb telescope of the Spirit" toward the murky places of our own world. Don't be afraid of what it will reveal - let's rather be glad to know what we didn't before. And pray for what this knowledge will call us to do, however deep into the dark we may have to go to meet the God we have been watching for.

Dismantling Racism Team (DRT)

Systemic racism is when a system ends up doing harm to people in a racial minority. The "system" can be government policy or corporate behavior. The policy or behavior does not need to name any particular racial group as its target in order to qualify, it simply has to disproportionately impact a racial minority.

Take the situation being faced by residents at Viking Terrace, a trailer park in Northfield. As reported by the Northfield News on July 6, new ownership is violating the law by having residents sign an onerous new lease agreement. Elements of the agreement include significant rent increases as well as new restrictions on such things as children playing outdoors, toys and decorations in yards, and built add-ons to trailers. These terms are not reflective of residents' previous lease agreements which are still in legal effect.

What makes this systemic racism? Most families in Viking Terrace are Latinx people. The economic system that is changing to make things worse is making things worse

for a community primarily composed of people of color. The policies themselves may not be racist but the fact that the people predominantly affected are not white is evidence of the racism built in to our system.

We are fighting racism. Your church has teamed up with other faith communities to do something about the Viking Terrace situation. We hosted an info session for people writing complaints to Minnesota's Attorney General on July 7. Ours was the first of three sessions organized at churches in town and over 40 people showed up to learn more and learn how to file a proper complaint.

During the July 12 City Council meeting three rooms full of public commentators were all ready to argue in favor of our neighbors at Viking Terrace. City Councilors clearly heard their community's support for people living here. We learned that, after receiving the complaints we had written, the Attorney General began working with the city attorney to support Northfield's residents at Viking Terrace.

That our community stood ready to support neighbors in a predominantly Latinx neighborhood shows our willingness to "Do Good." That our Latinx neighbors need the rest of the community to do so shows the reality of racism in our systems.

Systemic racism is sin, and our task is to root it out and dismantle it wherever we find it. This includes in the life of the church and the life of our broader community. The prophet Jeremiah encourages the people in exile in Babylon to "Pray for the good of the city in which you find yourselves, for in it's well-being you will find your well-being" (Jeremiah 29:7). Our advocacy for our neighbors at Viking Terrace is part of our commitment to repenting of all sin, systemic and individual, and working toward the kingdom of God.



We are called to live out our faith every day. That includes working for the wellbeing of everyone. Are you working for racial and economic equity for everyone as you go through your day? Two opportunities are highlighted this month:

Take time to learn about the character and positions of candidates in non-partisan and partisan primaries, seek God's guidance as you make a

faithful decision and then cast your ballot on August 9th or vote early by mail or in person.

Also, stay informed about Viking Terrace homeowners' complaints against the park owner about the unreasonable, and in some cases unlawful, requirements for renting their plots. Pray that the park owner and manufactured home owners can listen to each other and come to an agreement that allows the homeowners to continue to enjoy their homes and community. Be ready to take other action in support of our community residents when there is an alert.

Notes from the Parish Nurse

August is Psoriasis Awareness Month. The National Psoriasis Foundation website (www.psoriasis.org) shares information about the disease and hopes to spread awareness that the disease is not contagious. It helps people learn how to manage psoriasis while promoting research to find a cure for the disease. The Foundation also has a Helpline, which is 800-723-9166.

Psoriasis is one of the most common chronic skin conditions. Over 8 million Americans are affected by this autoimmune disease and nearly 1/3 of them will develop psoriatic arthritis. Psoriasis occurs when a trigger causes one's immune system to become overactive so skin cells grow too quickly. The result is a rapid build-up of extra skin cells which form silver scales and



red patches that can be itchy or painful. Although there is no cure for psoriasis, symptoms can be managed. The treatment goal is to stop skin cells from growing so quickly.

Symptoms of psoriasis differ from person to person. Common ones that can occur anywhere on the body, are the appearance of red patches of skin covered with thick silver scales or dry cracked skin that can bleed. Finger nails can become thick, pitted, and have ridges. And for some people stiff, swollen joints occur. A diagnosis of psoriasis can be made by observing the symptoms, taking a medical history, and doing a physical exam. Blood tests and/or a skin biopsy might also be done.

The most common symptoms of psoriatic arthritis include joint and back pain, stiffness and swelling of joints, and swollen and inflamed fingers or toes. Other symptoms include fatigue, skin rash, itching, dented nails, stomach problems, and eye pain. To diagnose psoriatic arthritis the methods listed above for the diagnosis of psoriasis are used with additional tests that could include x-rays, an MRI, or joint fluid tests. (www.mayoclinic.org)

Both genetics and environmental factors play a role in causing psoriasis and psoriatic arthritis. Some of the risk factors/triggers include: family history, viral or bacterial infections such as strep throat, injury to skin (e.g. bug bites, severe sunburn), stress (because of the impact on the immune system), smoking, obesity, heavy alcohol consumption, vitamin D deficiency, and some medications.

There are many different types of treatments for psoriasis and psoriatic arthritis. They might be used alone or in combination. Most physicians start with the mildest treatment, which is a topical medicine that can be purchased over the counter or by prescription. This may be combined with oral medications to be more effective. Physical therapy, occupational therapy and/or phototherapy (light) might be used too. Complementary and alternative medicine might be helpful to decrease symptoms. Biologics, drugs that alter the immune system, may be used for more difficult cases of the diseases.

People with psoriasis "have an increased risk of being diagnosed with depression and anxiety" and that risk may even be higher for people with psoriatic arthritis. (Rheumatologist Vinod Chandran, MD, PhD, www.psoriasis.org) Research has shown that this higher prevalence of mental health issues in people experiencing these diseases is related to the chronic pain, inflammatory state associated with the diseases, and the stigma one might feel because of the skin disease. Treatment for many people with these psoriatic diseases include taking a biologic and an antidepressant or anti-anxiety medication concurrently. Talk therapy and exercise are encouraged too.

No single treatment works for everyone, but good sleep, mindfulness practice, healthy eating, a regular exercise regimen that includes mobility and low impact exercise routines, medication, and alternative medicine can all lead to an outcome of improved energy, minimized joint damage, decreased anxiety and depression related to psoriatic diseases, and improved quality of life. In dealing with anxiety and depression, the National Psoriasis Foundation says, "You are not alone, we'll get better together."


The mother of our Bethlehem family is a baker, so this Brick Oven Bakery (B.O.B.) event is a fitting way to help support her and her family.


The lazy, hazy days of summer, get even lazier and hazier, but there is one book, which should be brought to your attention. Everyone's attention, young and older.




Another successful United Women in Faith Rummage Sale was held raising over \$2400 for UWF missions. Thank you to all who work so hard to continue this ministry year after year!
