Message from the Pastor

Parable Improv

When I lived in Denver, I took a class at Rise Comedy titled Improv 101. It was the prerequisite to Improv 201, which was the prerequisite to Improv 301, 401, 501, and 601.

Improv, which breathes in spontaneity, which lives in the moment, actually has a structure and rhythm. The basic building block of improv is "yes, and." It suggests that you should accept the contributions of another. You should acknowledge their reality and receive what they have to offer. You are not to say "no" – because that would shut down the story line.

You are to say "yes," and not only say "yes," but "yes, and."

The parables of Jesus require the same sort of agreement and spontaneity that we might reserve for improv comedy.

Let's consider a parable in Mark's gospel. Jesus asked, "What's a good image for God's kingdom? What parable can I use to explain it?" He then answered his own question: "Consider a mustard seed. When scattered on the ground, it's the smallest of all the seeds on the earth; but when it's planted, it grows and becomes the largest of all vegetable plants" (Mark 4:30-32).

Notice how none of the disciples said, "No. Botanically speaking, a grown mustard seed would be a herb, but sometimes a very big herb, popularly considered a shrub."

You don't correct the story line in improv. You don't say, "It's not a tree, it's a shrub."

Interestingly enough, Matthew and Luke, which were written a decade later, said "yes, and" to Mark.

On Celebration Sunday, we'll explore Matthew's riff of short parables – mustard seed, yeast, hidden treasures, pearls, nets. Each starts with the phrase, "The Kingdom of God is like..." yet continues with a different story line. We'll then begin to wonder, where is God calling us, individually and collectively, to say, "Yes, and" today?

The following Sunday, we'll then turn our attention to God's "Kingdom Come". We delve deeper into the Lord's Prayer, and the structure and rhythm it might provide to our lives. This six-week sermon series will be paired with a small group offering (see below).

As we enter the fall, I'm looking forward to the leading of God's "yes, and" Spirit.

Treasurer's Report for July 2024

General Fund

The Community Resource Bank checking account balance at the end of July was \$50,446.57. This is an increase of \$2,532.47 from the end of June balance of \$47,914.10. Due to cash flow, June and July apportionments have not been paid. Monthly apportionments are \$4,645.58.

Monthly Offering Income for July was \$33,963.72. Year to date (YTD) Actual Offering Income was \$182,924.68 which is \$35,721.94 less than YTD Last Year and \$50,408.67 less than a straight-line YTD Budget of \$233,333.35. General Fund Income Total for July was \$35,328.73. Other Income Totals of \$1,365.01 came from Interest Income and Regular Facility Usage. General Fund YTD Actual Income was \$197,704.48 which is \$46,314.61 less than YTD Last Year and \$45,983.07 less than a straight-line YTD Budget of \$243,687.55.

When comparing 2024 to 2023, YTD giving is down \$35,700. As noted in the April Treasurer's Report, several giving units have informed the church office that they are changing their giving pattern from monthly to end-of-year based on advice from their financial planner. Thus, monthly EFT giving has dropped from about \$7,000 to \$5,000. Weekly offering amounts have also decreased since more people are doing quarterly or end-of-year contributions. This change in giving patterns makes it difficult to manage cash flow.

Monthly Expense Totals for July were \$31,654.02. YTD Actual Expense Totals were \$236,649.79 which is \$31,915.01 less than YTD Last Year but \$28,433.75 more than a straight-line YTD Budget of \$208,216.04. YTD we are \$38,945.31 in the red, compared to \$35,471.51 we budgeted to be in the black.

Physical Plant

Support from General Fund income for July was \$10,305.58. YTD Actual Income was \$115,842.85 and was made up of \$77,219.18 from General Fund Support for Physical Plant, \$5,095.00 from continuing contributions to the last Building Campaign, and a total of \$33,528.67 from the Building Maintenance Endowment made up of an Annual Interest Income disbursement of \$21,928.67 and a \$11,600.00 disbursement for the increase in Gap Insurance (wind and hail damage beyond regular insurance coverage). YTD Actual Expenses were \$93,396.55 which leaves a positive balance of \$22,446.30.

Endowment Funds

At the end of December 2023 these funds totaled \$941,047.78 which includes \$334,802.54 that we owe ourselves from the last building campaign. The YTD Balance at the end of July was \$926,516.89. Considering disbursements, the combined Endowment Funds show a gain of \$33,671.99 (about 6.25%) during the first seven months of 2024. A 6% disbursement, a total of \$36,602.88, on the balance in the accounts as of the April 30th statement, was taken in May. An additional \$11,600 from the Building Maintenance Endowment was also taken in May to cover the unexpected fourfold increase in gap insurance.

Introductions were shared. This was a first meeting for 3 incoming Board members: Marilyn Hanson, Kerry Cipra, and Mary Twitchell.

Approval of Minutes - David Wolf moved approval of the May 15 minutes, Pierce seconded. Motion approved.

Approval of Agenda- Agenda approved without objection.

Agenda items

Onboarding New Members – Pierce shared the UMC Mission statement and responsibilities and our Core Values. Pierce also shared our signature Ministry goals/projects. Kevin shared Board purpose, structure, and functions. Brief discussion ensued.

Fiduciary

Staff/Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) - Sara asked about opportunities to meet with Pastor Donna in small group settings. Setting up 6-10 dinners hosted by willing congregation members. If anyone is willing to help Sara, please let her know. Mary Twitchell offered to assist.

Facilities – Bruce Paulson shared a report about the state of the parsonage. One document he shared summarized major parsonage renovations completed in March -October 2021. A second document outlined current and potential parsonage projects as of July 15, 2024. Much discussion about what to do with these reports. Jessy suggested the facilities team prioritize the list highlighting immediate needs, a timeline and cost. Some discussion about the value of the parsonage and the need for a church parsonage. Bruce or a member of the Facilities team will report back with a prioritized list.

Finance – Treasurer's Report – David shared the Treasurer's Report for May-June 2024. See attached. The treasurer's report was approved.

Ministry Items:

Back to School event - Pierce shared plans for our 2nd annual back to school event for the church. The event will be held August 24 from 1-4PM. Volunteers and publicity help will be greatly appreciated. Kevin will check with the SALT team HS students...eligible for National Honor Society Volunteer hours. Pierce will get flyers distributed. Looking at an overall budget of \$500.

Other items – A question for future discussion. Should Super Wednesday meals continue throughout the summer? Connecting with those who organize will be important. Past experience indicated low turnout in the summer months.

Jesse Steed is looking for volunteers for Sunday Sound/video. Pierce suggested he set up an instruction sheet for potential volunteers

Adjournment – Pierce motioned to adjourn, seconded by Jessy. Motion carried and meeting adjourned at 6:44 p.m.

If you are wanting to vote absentee in the November 5 election and did not do that on your application for an absentee ballot for the August primary, apply now. You can do

that online, or print the application from that website (and follow directions for returning it) at the MN Secretary of State website: https://www.sos.state.mn.us/elections-voting/other-ways-to-vote/vote-early-by-mail/. Absentee ballots will be mailed out as early as September 20. Once you return your ballot, you can check the Secretary of State website to see if it has been delivered and accepted.

A recent ISAIAH-MN email challenges us with the following words:

"As people of faith, we are challenged to engage deeply with our democracy — not as passive participants, but as active agents of change. In this crucial time, when the weight of political decisions feels heavy, we are called to use our freedom not for selfish gain or fear mongering, but to create good in the world, to uplift our communities, and to work together for the common good.

Even when some seek to divide us by sowing seeds of fear and mistrust, we are called to be bearers of light, joy, and hope. Our faith is not in the fleeting promises of political leaders but in the enduring love and justice of our Creator God, calling us to be powerful political actors in our own right. This is our prophetic task: to envision and work toward a future where all people are valued and where our collective actions reflect the divine love that binds us together.

We must exercise our right to vote, engage in our communities, and use our agency to shape the state and country we need. But we must also keep our trust in the One who holds the future. In this trust, we find the courage to act, to hope, and to love. Together, we make our future."

Mission Sewing Project



Notes from the Parish Nurse

September is Peripheral Artery Disease (PAD) Awareness Month. This disease is a leading but preventable cause of death in the United States. It affects nearly 20 million Americans. (www.scai.org) PAD is an atherosclerotic disease that causes plaque (fats and cholesterol) to build up in the arteries in one's arms and legs, though more commonly in the legs. Narrowed blood vessels make it harder for the blood to carry nutrients and oxygen to tissues in the area. When there is not enough blood flow to keep up with the demand of exercise, it results in leg pain called claudication. This pain is also intermittent because the leg pain starts with walking or exercise and goes away with rest.



Though some people have no symptoms with PAD, most people have a few common symptoms. The first symptom is usually pain, cramping, or discomfort in one's legs or buttocks (intermittent claudication). The pain can be described as dull and aching, muscles tiring out, or an actual muscle spasm or cramp. The more activity, the more pain. Some people may feel numbness if the nerves are not getting enough blood flow. "An important detail about claudication is that it affects muscles only. It doesn't cause arthritis and joint pain. The pain should also stop within a few minutes—or even less—once you stop to rest." (www.clevelandclinic.org) Other symptoms include coldness, numbness, or weakness in one's lower legs. The affected extremity may have shiny skin, skin color changes, slow growing toenails, hair loss or slow hair growth, more frequent skin and soft tissue infections of feet and legs, or toe and foot sores that don't heal. Pulses in legs and feet often are weak or absent. If the condition is severe, pain might occur when one is lying down during rest or sleep. (www.mayoclinic.org)

There are a number of risk factors for developing PAD, but tobacco use is a significant one. Statistics show that 80% of people with PAD currently smoke or have smoked in the past. "Tobacco use increases the risk for PAD by 400%. It also brings on PAD symptoms almost 10 years earlier." (www.clevelandclinic.org) Other risk factors include having diabetes, high blood pressure, high cholesterol levels, obesity, kidney disease, blood clotting disorder, personal or family history of blood vessel disease, heart disease, or stroke, age (most frequently over 65 years), or being African American.

Early detection and treatment are important. "Half of the people who have PAD don't have any symptoms. PAD can build up over a lifetime. Symptoms may not become obvious until later in life. For many people symptoms won't appear until their artery narrows by 60% or more." (www.clevelandclinic.org) Techniques used to diagnose PAD are a physical exam, medical history, symptoms, feeling and listening to pulses in extremities, ankle-brachial index (ABI) which compares the blood pressure in one's ankle to one's arm, angiography which is imaging by using dye, MRI, CT scan, or vascular ultrasound.

There are two important goals for treating peripheral artery disease. The first is to reduce one's risk of cardiovascular events such as heart attack or stroke. And secondly to improve one's quality of live by easing pain that occurs when walking so exercise can be more comfortable. (www.mayoclinic.org) Lifestyle changes include quit using tobacco products; eat a balanced diet that is high in fiber and low in cholesterol, fat, and sodium; drink plenty of water to stay hydrated; exercise by walking regularly; manage health issues such as high blood pressure, diabetes, and high cholesterol; maintain a healthy weight; get good sleep; keep stress low with yoga or meditation; and have good foot and skin care. Medical treatments include medications such as blood thinners or statins, and medications used to control diabetes or high blood pressure. Surgical treatments include angioplasty to open a narrowed or blocked artery by inserting a stent, bypass surgery to insert a new blood vessel, or atherectomy to remove the plaque.

Community

Community. That's what I think of when this time of year comes around. When over 200,000 folks flock to Northfield for 5 days of cowboys, carnival rides, classic cars, craft fairs and of course corn dogs over a 5 day span of Defeat of Jesse James Days (DJJD). There's of course a lot more going on than just those items, there's literally something for everyone. As usual I will be away from the office for that time period as I serve as treasurer for the DJJD organization as well as helping out at a



few events, specifically the Entertainment Center and the Parade line up. I'm sure I will see several of you during this time as well, since there are many Northfield United Methodist Church folks who volunteer during the weekend at various events (car show, raid re-enactment, Entertainment Center, rodeo, garbage pickup, parade banner carriers, bike ride, craft fair, concession stands, just to name a few) besides those just enjoying the festivities. I love and am very thankful for how the NUMC community has not only supported my involvement over the years but has embraced being a part of the DJJD community with volunteers at events. You truly understand and partake in being a part of this wonderful community celebration. There are many NUMC members who overlap with DJJD in many ways either through the church itself or through their various non-profit affiliations. Seeing so many of you at events warms my heart and makes me so proud to be a part of the NUMC community.



This year marks 41 years that I have been a volunteer on the DJJD committee. When people ask me why I continue to do it I have a very simple answer. Community. I love the DJJD celebration and what it represents. I have always been a history buff and while DJJD is about history it is also so much more. If you have never taken the tour of the Northfield Historical Society bank museum or watched a bank raid re-enactment I highly recommend it. The re-enactors are all volunteers who do an amazing job of telling the story of how a group of community members defeated the James-Younger gang, one of the most notorious gang of outlaws at the time, and triggered the largest manhunt in the history of the United States. There were many local heroes that day and it

is the extraordinary courage of these ordinary community members that we honor each year, specifically Joseph Lee Heywood who was the acting cashier of the bank that day and gave his life defending it.

At the time of the raid the bank held deposits from St. Olaf College and Carleton College, as well as many businesses and prominent leaders in town. In 1876 there was no FDIC insurance that would have covered the bank's losses. After the raid, both college presidents said their institutions would have closed down had the bank lost all its money that day. In the end the bank's cash in the vault remained untouched, the robbers got away with only \$26.70. An alert community saved a community bank thus saving the community of Northfield. Had the raid been successful, Northfield would quite possibly be a much different place today.

What a lot of people do not realize about DJJD, and what I am most proud of, is what a large financial impact the DJJD celebration has on numerous non-profit organizations in this community.



More than 40 area non-profits use the DJJD weekend to generate funds, raising more than \$150,000-\$200,000 each year through event sponsorships, sales of products, etc. Additionally, the DJJD committee pays out \$40,000-\$50,000 each year directly to non-profits that are contracted to help at events throughout the weekend. Groups at NUMC have been the recipient of some of these funds in the past. In the last 9 years, the DJJD committee has donated nearly \$60,000 to the Northfield Hospital Breast Care Center and the Northfield Hospital Cancer Care and Infusion Center from funds raised during the celebration as part of the Give Cancer the Boot

campaign held during DJJD weekend. The DJJD committee awards 5 scholarships each year totaling \$8000 to the DJJD Ambassadors. All of these funds being raised at DJJD. After the tragedy in Burnsville this year and discovering that our local Fire Department and EMS do not receive any funding for protective vests the DJJD committee in conjunction with the Northfield VFW Auxiliary rallied community members and raised over \$32,000 to purchase vests for each member of the Northfield Fire Department and the Northfield Hospital and Clinics EMS. This will be an ongoing fundraiser during DJJD this year so as to provide a continuing fund to keep our 1st Responders safe. This is what a community of people do and this is why the Defeat of Jesse James Days celebration is so much more than a 5 day festival. The funds raised for non-profits helps make our

community a better place for so many people.

Whether it's your church, neighbors, friends, work, or a community festival, our lives are so enhanced by being a part of a community. I hope you all get a chance to attend an event or grab a corndog on Bridge Square and soak in some "community" during Defeat of Jesse James Days. I know I will.
