

Message from the Pastor

Darkness

Stores are playing "Joy to the World," Starbucks is serving Gingerbread Chai Lattes, and trees are aglow with radiant lights. We are rushing full force toward Christmas. Soon, we will be lighting candles and hearing John declare, "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overtake it." (John 1:5)

Our towns and cities are filled with images of bustle and brightness. Yet the coming of the Christ child does not occur amid a splash of artificial light but in the stillness of night's darkness.

In the Northern Hemisphere, the season of Advent—the four weeks leading up to Christmas—coincides with some of the longest nights of the year. We often refer to darkness in negative terms. We think of the darkness of terror in our world—in Palestine and Israel, Ukraine, and Sudan. There is also the darkness of anguish in our lives: depression, addiction, angst, illness, trauma. Such terror and anguish weigh heavily on our hearts.

Advent is not a time to artificially light the darkness but to trust that even in its depths, God is present. God is with those who experience acts of terror and trauma, God is with those in the midst of a raging storm, God is with those who engage in acts of compassion, who march for justice, who seek to tread more gently upon our planet. God is with those who wrestle with their own dark nights of the soul. The season of Advent is a time of germination, where even in the darkness, God's thrill of hope begins to take root.

On Christmas Eve, we will hear Isaiah's words: "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness—on them light has shined" (Isaiah 9:2). We will welcome the Christ child, Emmanuel—God with us—trusting that Christ is present even in the darkest corners of our lives.

Our worship services will be held at 4:30 p.m. and 10:00 p.m. Consider attending one or both of these services, and invite a family member, neighbor, or friend to join you.

Treasurer's Report for October 2024

Summary:

General Fund

- The checking account balance of \$48,763.27 at the end of October was \$7,420.12 more than at the end of September. August, September and October apportionments have not been paid.
- Monthly Offering Income for October was \$18,957.66 and Other Income Totals were \$2,826.07 which yields a General Fund Income Total of \$21,783.73.
- Monthly Expense Totals for October were \$34,903.38.
- YTD Expenses are \$66,695.46 more than YTD Income.
- Fourth quarter income is expected to increase as members fulfill their annual giving goals.

Physical Plant

- Income total for October was \$13,844.60.
- YTD Actual Income was \$144,290.66 and YTD Actual Expenses were \$131,192.24 which leaves a positive balance of \$19.393.42.

Endowment Funds

• Considering receipts and disbursements, the combined endowment funds show a YTD market gain of \$29,660.21 (about 7.4%) through October 2024.

Details:

General Fund

The checking account balance of \$48,763.27 at the end of October was \$7,420.12 more than the end of September balance of \$41,343.15. Due to cash flow, August, September and October apportionments have not been paid. Monthly apportionments are \$4,645.58.

Monthly Offering Income for October was \$18,957.66. Year to date (YTD) Offering Income was \$248,513.66 which is \$34,015.94 less than YTD Last Year and \$84,819.68 less than a straight-line YTD Budget of \$333,333.34. Other Income Totals of \$2,826.07 came from Interest Income, Super Wednesday Meal Proceeds and Regular Facility Usage. Thus, General Fund Income Total for October was \$21,783.73. General Fund YTD Income was \$268,150.49 which is \$46,889.84 less than YTD Last Year and \$79,974.53 less than a straight-line YTD Budget of \$348,125.02. As noted in the April report, weekly offering amounts have decreased since more members are doing quarterly or end-of-year contributions. This change in giving patterns makes it difficult to manage cash flow. Fourth quarter income is expected to increase as members fulfill their annual giving goals.

Monthly Expense Totals for October were \$34,903.38. YTD Actual Expense Totals were \$334,845.95 which is \$27,199.66 less than YTD Last Year but \$37,394.79 more than a straight-line YTD Budget of \$297,451.16. YTD we are \$66,695.46 in the red, compared to \$50,673.86 we budgeted to be in the black.

Physical Plant

Income total for October was \$13,844.60, which includes: Support from General Fund of \$13,164.60 and \$680.00 donations to the Building Fund. YTD Actual Income was \$144,290.66 which includes: \$110.761.99 Support from General Fund for Physical Plant; \$6,295.00 from contributions of to the Building Fund; and \$33,528.67 disbursement from the Building Maintenance Endowment made up of an Annual Interest Income of \$21,928.67 and \$11,600.00 for the increase in Gap Insurance (wind and hail damage beyond regular insurance coverage). YTD Actual Expenses were \$131,192.24 which leaves a positive balance of \$19,393.42.

Endowment Funds

At the end of December 2023 these funds totaled \$941,047.78 which includes \$334,802.54 that we owe ourselves from the last building campaign. The Undesignated Endowment fund received \$127,100.20 from the Anne B. Mayer Charitable Fund in August. The YTD Balance at the end of October was \$1,039,514.90. A 6% disbursement on the balance in the funds as of the April 30th statement, a total of \$36,602.88, was taken in May. An additional \$11,600.00 from the Building Maintenance fund was also taken in May to cover the unexpected fourfold increase in gap insurance. In October \$20,000.00 was taken from the Undesignated fund to supplement the checking account balance due to less than expected monthly offering income. Considering receipts and disbursements, the combined endowment funds show a YTD market gain of \$29,660.21 (about 7.4%) through October 2024.

Notes from Isaiah Northfield Post-Election Strategy Session 11/14/24

Initially, Isaiah Organizer Kathryn Lozada shared personal responses to the elections and invited others to share in small groups. She reminded us that building a "beloved community" of justice and inclusion in Minnesota is a year-around, all-the-time commitment, no matter the current political map.

What Isaiah and Supporters Accomplished in Minnesota in 2023-2024 Legislative Biennium: voters' rights increased and expanded, affordable transportation in the metro, 100% clean energy by 2030, paid family and medical leave, driver's licenses for all regardless of immigration status, \$1 billion investment for affordable housing, red flag unlaw to limit gun violence, statewide commuter rail, raising childcare reimbursement rates, and other measures.

Table Discussions allowed participants to share thoughts on how they came to the meeting, and how they leaned into their values during the election season. Some spoke of donations and organizing, or speaking with friends and family. Others spoke of regret that they did not do more. Voting was very strong, but some were concerned that Northfield and campuses are "an echo chamber", even in Rice County.

Minnesota State Representative (58A District) Purcell addressed the gathering regarding the elections. She said she is the last DFL representative in MN in a rural district. She described the evenly split House (67-67), and early efforts to keep it productive. Representative Purcell spoke of the active initiatives and legislative actions of the 2024. She sees this legislative session as focused on protecting the actions of the past two years.

Trainings may be offered in areas like (1) "deep listening" with neighbors in wider community as a foundation of people-centered democracy, (2) research visit training to engage local decision-makers about housing, climate and transportation priorities, and finally—(3) immigrant solidarity training.

Proposed Isaiah Path Through 2025—Plans so far:

- Weekly Isaiah Southern MN Legislative Co-governance Zooms with partner legislators
- Revenue Rally at MN Capitol on Wed., 1/29, for an Abundant Moral Budget
- Building the Future Lobby Day at the MN Capitol in mid-February/early March on housing, economy and job
- Northfield "in district" meeting with legislators in early April?
- Earth Day Action and "day without cars" on 4/25 at the Capitol
- May stay nimble for the end of the legislative session
- December 13, 2025: Isaiah-wide convention to prepare for 2026

Dismantling Racism Team (DRT)



Monday, January 20, 2025, is Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. This federal holiday celebrates the achievements of civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. First introduced just four days after his assassination on April 4, 1968, the legislation establishing the holiday didn't get passed until 15 years later. It was signed into law by President Reagan in 1983, and took an additional 17 years to be fully recognized in all 50 states. In 1994, under President Clinton, it became the only federal holiday dedicated to volunteerism, after Congress passed the King Holiday and Service Act. This act encourages Americans to observe the day "with acts of civic work and community service" in honor of King's legacy.

If you're looking for a way to volunteer for a project related to civil rights, you can do so without even leaving the house by helping the Smithsonian Museum transcribe the Freedmen's Bureau records. Visit https://nmaahc.si.edu/explore/initiatives/freedmens-bureau-records for more information. Or if you'd prefer to recognize the holiday by learning more about the Civil Rights Movement, consider visiting the Coretta Scott King Rose Gallery, an immersive digital experience hosted by The King Center.

Northfield UMC will celebrate MLK Day by inviting Cynthia Wilson, NAACP President, to preach on January 19. She will also lead an adult forum after worship. Cynthia has lived with her family in North Minneapolis and worked in various roles for the City of Minneapolis for more than 30 years. She has held several positions within the Minneapolis NAACP Branch, working to hold systems accountable for the injustices she has seen. Please join us at worship and afterwards to learn from this dynamic leader.

We have begun reviewing integers and fractions as an introduction to algebra, and in science, we are currently learning about the properties of matter and the transfer of liquids. As for my passion for football, I play as an attacking midfielder, contributing to scoring and assisting goals. I thank you for your kind words, which have had a wonderful impact on my life. From dad

My friends and brothers, I hope you are all well. I thank you from the bottom of my heart for your continued concern for my health. I am still undergoing ongoing tests, and now I am waiting for the results of the genetic test for the CALR mutation, as it is possible that the disease could progress from myelofibrosis to acute myeloid leukemia. Therefore, we are conducting all the necessary tests, but due to the limited resources available in our government hospitals. Once again, I express my gratitude to you, and I always pray for you. I kindly ask you, my brothers, to remember me in your prayers. Your loving brother.

IT Tech Corner By Jesse Steed

It's almost the new year again and it's time to check in on how you did last year. When I evaluate something I like to look back on how successful it was last time or how stressed out it made me feel and I vow to make it more successful or less stressful this time around.

Last year I asked you to clean out your email inbox. Just because email messages don't stack up on the dining room table doesn't mean they don't take up space. They occupy virtual file space and can reach a limit, like the 15GB in a typical Gmail account (I'm only at 14.1GB, so, totally ok still.) Email messages also occupy your headspace and pile up in

your brain, potentially consuming your thoughts or slowly driving you down Stress Street until you finally reply 2 weeks later.

Some messages are simply an FYI and warrant a simple reply of thanks or acknowledgement. Others should be deleted immediately after reading (this message will self-destruct, to save me the time of hitting the delete key.)

It is OK TO DELETE MESSAGES. Even on accident. If it's important, the sender will call you or mail you a letter to follow up on your non-response (though you should reply to my messages right away, definitely.)

But what about those messages that require time to ponder? How can I keep a tidy inbox and still dedicate the care and attention I devote to correspondence? You can use reminder tools to help track your progress. Gmail provides tools such as Snooze, Add To Tasks, and Create Event. These built-in ways to revisit the email message make it easier to accomplish if you are unable to respond right away. Google Calendar makes it easy to schedule appointments for yourself, or deadlines to accomplish tasks. Speaking of tasks, instead of creating a calendar event, make it a task! Google Tasks roll along each day until you complete them, so you have the constant nagging reminder of that thing you promised yourself you would do.

There are any number of reminder and progress tracking apps and tools to help keep your inbox tidy. May the new year give you hope, less stress, and more happiness online.

- You have the right to ask for support from friends, family, church, and/or community.
- You have the right to give gifts that are within your holiday budget.
- You have the right to say no to alcohol, drugs, cigarettes, and a second piece of pie.
- You have the right <u>not</u> to ride with a drunk driver.
- You have the right to take away the keys of a drunk friend or relative and to call a taxi.
- You have the right to smile at harried salesclerks and angry drivers, and to give them a PEACE of your mind.

In the end, these things matter most: How well did you love? How fully did you live? How deeply did you learn to let go and let Christ live through you? Blessings for a Joyous Christmas!

Whether we write them out, or just think about them, most of us make resolutions because we can't help but be inspired by the fresh beginnings of a new year. Making resolutions brings with it thoughts of past failures and guarded hopes for the future.

HOW TO MAKE RESOLUTIONS "FAIL-PROOF"

- 1. Keep goals realistic by setting ones that you can reach. Don't set yourself up for failure!
- 2. Be specific about your goals. Say, "I will lose one pound per week until I reach my goal."
- 3. Develop a plan for how you will reach your goals. Write down strategies and resources. Remember that prayer is a powerful resource.
- 4. Find a partner, as moral support can be a big help in reaching your goals. Don't forget that Jesus makes an excellent support person.
- 5. Keep track of your progress so you can see changes a day or a week at a time.
- 6. Think of each day as a new beginning. Resolutions don't need to be kept for 365 consecutive days, but for just one day at a time.

GIRLS IN THE WILD FIG TREE: HOW I FOUGHT TO SAVE MYSELF, MY SISTER AND THOUSANDS OF GIRLS WORLDWIDE. This memoir from Kenyan human rights activist Nice Leng'ete shares how she went from a heartbroken child and community outcast, to a leader of the Maasai. She works to end female genital mutilation and replace it with alternative rites of passage.

RAISE YOUR VOICE: WHY WE STAY SILENT AND HOW TO SPEAK UP. Author Kathy Khang addresses what it looks like to raise our voice in a culture that often encourages silence – particularly when race, ethnicity and gender are factors. Khang offers insights on when and how to speak, how to hear God's invitation to steward our authentic voice and how to communicate the good news in a messed up world.

THE LIGHT WE CARRY: OVERCOMING IN UNCERTAIN TIMES. Michelle Obama shares practical wisdom and powerful strategies for staying hopeful and balanced in today's highly uncertain world. She opens a frank dialogue with readers, considering the questions many of us wrestle with: How do we build enduring and honest relationships? How can we discover strength and community inside our differences? What tools do we use to address feelings of self-doubt or helplessness?
