# Message from the Pastor

#### **Everything [In] Between**

The story of Lent is a story of messy middles. Jesus is on the road, but he's not there yet. Jesus is telling stories, but the crowds don't understand. Jesus is leading a parade, but the crowds don't understand. Jesus is risen, but the disciples can't forget the cross.

We live in the messy middle – the spaces between what was and what will be. We live between joy and sorrow, mountaintops and valley lows, brokenness and wholeness, certainty and doubt. This Lent, our church will journey together through *Everything [In] Between*, a beautifully crafted resource by A Sanctified Art. We will wade into the middle of our sacred texts to find God and stretch our understanding beyond the binaries that our world so often gives.

Beginning on Ash Wednesday, the Gospel of Luke will be our guide with Jesus setting his face toward Jerusalem (Luke 9:51). From there, we will explore several familiar stories – the Good Samaritan, the Lost Sheep, Zacchaeus, and more. We'll notice the dichotomies – intention and action, stranger and neighbor, lost and found, righteousness and mercy. And we will also imagine where God might be meeting us beyond the categories we create.

Throughout his ministry, Jesus often highlighted the cultural and political polarities of his time to emphasize the radical, inclusive, and surprising love of God. When we study these stories in their historical and cultural context, we begin to see how they mirror the cultural and political divides many of us experience today – in our families, churches, and communities.

Rather than seeking clear-cut, easy answers, this series encourages us to trust that God shows up in ways we don't expect. Instead of the monochrome tones of right or wrong, true or false, this or that, we'll encounter the kaleidoscopic hues of the messy middle.

Each week, we will engage with scripture, art, and poetry designed to expand our imagination of faith, deepen our understanding of justice, and open our hearts to the Spirit's work in the in-between. Lenten Devotional Booklets and Lenten Cards will also be available. This journey is not just about preparing for Easter morning – it's about embracing the sacred unknown, honoring our questions, and finding courage to participate in God's ongoing work of love and liberation.

I invite you to join us as we walk through this sacred season together. May we step boldly into the messy middle, trusting that God is not only with us, but is also calling us forward in this moment in history – a moment that desperately yearns for resurrection hope.

#### The Final Days: A Lenten Journey through the Gospels

The four New Testament Gospels aren't the same story, but they offer the same Resurrection hope. Matthew, Mark, Luke and John devote most of their story detailing Jesus' last week in Jerusalem, all highlighting Jesus' triumphant entry into the city, the suffering and humiliation of the cross, and the empty tomb come Sunday morning, but the stories they tell aren't quite the same.

Each gospel offers a different lens through which we understand Jesus' Passion. One portrait reveals Jesus to be in control, while another emphasizes his suffering. In one story Jesus offers hope to the thief on the cross, and in another Jesus only receives derision. These different perspectives aren't a reason to dismiss the Gospels; rather they reveal an abundant, diverse and complementary picture of God's work in the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus.

#### Dreams of the Bible: God's Forgotten Language

Dreams have fascinated people for centuries, often seen as mysterious messages from beyond or reflections of our inner thoughts. In the Bible, dreams are not merely random images during sleep but are a means through which God communicates with individuals. There are numerous examples in the Old and New Testaments where dreams convey divine revelations, warnings, and guidance. Exploring the biblical perspective on dreams, we can better understand their significance, how they were used in biblical times, and how they hold spiritual meaning for believers today.

#### Caring for Creation: What Then Shall We Do? (John 3:10)

An invitation from Tim Goodwin and Clay Oglesbee (retired Elder)

Starting on Sunday, April 27 our congregation will host a four-week worship-and-teaching series, *Caring for Creation:* "What Then Should We Do?". We invite our members, as well as guests from the wider community, to consider together current understandings of climate change or climate crisis, the implications for us and for all in these times. We ask, depending on our understanding of what is taking place, what is a faithful response? "What then shall we do?" (John 3:10).

Why are we offering this series? Studies and observations by most trained scientists today indicate that we are undermining our planet's ecosystems and its healthfulness for living creatures by the extent and rate of burning fossil fuels and emitting carbon dioxide and other gasses like methane into our atmosphere. In fact, 99.3 percent of active researchers and scientists say that we are experiencing "incontrovertible evidence of planetary-scale warming" due to the Greenhouse Effect (carbon dioxide and other gases accumulating in the atmosphere which tends to hold heat on the surface or in the oceans). The effects include:

- Arctic sea ice is being reduced by 12% per decade since 1979 (the air conditioning for our planet)
- Some monitored wildlife vertebrate and fresh water species have been reduced in numbers by 75-85% since the first Earth Day fifty-five years ago (World Wildlife Federation)

- Sea levels are rising, and there are more and longer-lasting heat waves and global drought so that public health and adequate food and water supplies are threatened
- Increasingly powerful and damaging hurricanes, tornadoes, fires, hail and flooding point toward increasing losses and insurance costs
- Infectious diseases or pandemics are more common and spread more rapidly due to intense and extended heat waves
- Global climate refugees are said to be in the tens of millions now and projected into the billions in decades to come
- Carbon dioxide and other gases in the atmosphere will linger for decades or centuries or longer, and will already
  indefinitely affect quality of life on earth; carbon storage and many other technological steps are needed to slow, reduce
  or eliminate carbon emissions

Our Leadership Board, while holding varying opinions about climate change, has agreed it is important and timely to examine scientific evidence, to observe our own experiences, and to reflect together on how our Faith guides us to care for the planet, and what actions we each might take. We are open to many answers to these questions; the point is to share questions, share our values, and act to Care for Creation.

The past few weeks have seen a dizzying number of dismaying actions at the federal level. Some family members, friends, neighbors and strangers have seen their lives turned upsidedown; others live in fear that they may be next.

As the ISAIAH-MN newsletter of Feb. 11 expressed it: "In moments like these, it is easy to feel overwhelmed — to believe the lie that we are powerless, that the battle is too great, and that our communities are too fractured to resist. But the truth, as scripture reminds us, is that **we are strongest when we are together.** 

We must not let chaos pull us apart. The tools of division — racism, fear, and scarcity — are nothing new; they are the weapons of empire used for generations to break our collective power. But we serve a God of justice, a God who calls us into beloved community, into the kind of unity that can withstand every assault. Now is the time to double down on our mission: building a multiracial democracy and a caring economy where all can thrive. **We will not be distracted. We will not be divided.** We will stay organized, rooted in faith, and focused on the work of love and liberation. Because together, bound in the strength of God's justice, we are unbreakable."

### **Notes from the Parish Nurse**

March is National Nutrition Month®. The Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics has created the campaign annually since 1980 because of growing public interest in nutrition. "The campaign focuses attention on the importance of making informed food choices and developing sound eating and physical activity habits." This year's theme is "Food Connects Us." We are connected with our cultures, our families, and our friends by the food we prepare and eat. "What's more, health, memories, traditions, seasons,



and access can all impact our relationship with food." During National Nutrition Month we can learn about "these connections and how the food [we] eat impacts [our] health throughout life."

The website <u>www.eatright.org</u> contains a lot of valuable information from The Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics about exercise, wellness, and nutrition. Some of the topics covered are:

- Eating Right and Reduce Food Waste
- Eating Right on a Budget
- Eating Right: Tips for Older Adults
- Healthy Eating on the Run: A Month of Tips
- Smart Snacking Tips for Adults and Teens
- Smart Snacking Tips for Kids

Sometimes people complain about becoming forgetful as they are aging. That can be caused by lack of sleep, genetics, physical activity level, lifestyle, and environmental factors. Another big factor in brain health is diet! Good blood flow to the brain helps boosts memory and brain function. Researchers have found that eating a Mediterranean Diet not only helps the cardiovascular system, but it helps keep aging brains sharp. The tip sheet "4 Types of Foods to Help Boost Your Memory" lists the following:

- Eat your veggies: especially broccoli, cabbage, and dark leafy greens
- "Be sweet on berries and cherries": blackberries, blueberries, and cherries
- Consume food containing omega-3 fatty acids: salmon, bluefin tuna, sardines, and herring
- "Work in walnuts" by adding to oatmeal or salads, snacking on a handful, or mixing them into stir-fried vegetables for extra protein

Whether we are young or old or somewhere in between, good nutrition is important to our health and well-being. Take a moment to check the above website and see if you can make some healthy changes in your diet.

Part of United Women in Faith's work is in their Social Action initiatives. The following are excerpts from the United Methodist Insight article, edited for length.

### Micah 6:8 Pledge Draws More Than 2,600 to Faith, Community by Cynthia B. Astle February 5, 2025 United Methodist Insight Special Feature source: um-insight.net

"Our Micah 6:8 Pledge is a movement that inspires courage and action, 'What does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" said Emily Jones, UWFaith's executive for racial justice and director of the organization's reading program."

"It's about what we're called to do in this moment, when many folks are wondering how to act (in response to the new federal administration)," Jones told *United Methodist Insight* in an online interview. The Micah 6:8 Pledge is intended to give people spiritual encouragement and a willingness to act in society according to the scripture's instruction. "We trust God's promise to give us a future with hope, ...;" Jones said.

"We make change most effectively as women of faith operating in a community; we think there's something powerful about being a sisterhood that's working together collaboratively," said Jones. "We build spiritual resolve and mission effectiveness working together, especially in this moment for intersectional justice." "How do I make sense of it?" she asked. "Stay in community, be in sisterhood and share communal strength."

"UWFaith transformation officer Khia Shaw-Wilson said "remember who we are, channeling the courage and wisdom of our foremothers to commit to God's work." She believes the Micah 6:8 Pledge reminds people that United Women in Faith, reaffirms principles of justice, kindness and love of God it has held for 156 years. For example, UWFaith still supports some 80 national mission institutions such as [Emma Norton Services] Bethlehem Centers and Wesley Centers, along with organizing and leading annual Mission u educational gatherings."

"Shaw-Wilson affirmed that UWFaith will continue to organize grassroots activism, especially around Reading Program emphases like racial disparities in maternal health, mass incarceration and climate justice. UWFaith also will continue to amplify women's voices and equip them for church leadership, she said."
